



Liaison of Independent Filmmakers of Toronto (LIFT) and imagineNATIVE Film + Media Arts Festival 2017 MENTORSHIP ANNOUNCEMENT

Toronto, March 29, 2017—imagineNATIVE Film + Media Arts Festival and the Liaison of Independent Filmmakers of Toronto (LIFT) are pleased to announce that Toronto-based Kichwa (Ecuador) artist Samay Arcentales Cajas is the recipient of the 13th annual LIFT/imagineNATIVE Mentorship. This annual mentorship was developed to offer an Indigenous artist living in the Greater Toronto Area the opportunity to expand their practice into the realm of film, and present their new work in a professional context. Samay will be paired with a suitable mentor, enrolled in LIFT's seasonal workshops and will be provided with access to LIFT's production and post-production equipment. She will receive additional financial and resource support from imagineNATIVE and other to-be-confirmed mentorship partners to complete a film to premiere at the 2017 imagineNATIVE festival (October 18–22).

"LIFT is very excited to support Samay this year as part of our mentorship programme," says Chris Kennedy, LIFT's Executive Director. "The metaphoric and utopic ideals behind her script are a necessary cross-generational call for re-affirmation in troubling times. We are looking forward to seeing this project come to full fruition!"

"imagineNATIVE was impressed with Samay's diversity of experiences in art and education, gaining experience with Toronto's Indigenous artists in varying capacities," adds Daniel Northway-Frank, imagineNATIVE's Industry Director. "Her treatment for her project is ripe with possibilities that can be investigated through LIFT's workshops to find the ideal way bring it to life. We're excited to premiere this work at the 18th imagineNATIVE Film + Media Arts Festival."

Samay Arcentales Cajas is a Kichwa (Ecuador) digital media and community artist born in Toronto. In her creative practice, she explores the sense of being uprooted, the migration experience, and the meaning of urban indigeneity. Through multimedia work and performance she tangles and untangles her mixed ancestry by including the voices of her family and community. Much of her inspiration comes from her multiple histories and ever-evolving relationships with the outside world, its people, and technology. Her creative journey in the digital realm began with the creation of "Mi Familia Annex Audio Tour", a tour that sketches her family map in the highly-gentrified Annex neighbourhood. Her first short stop motion film "Rimanakuna", premiered at imagineNATIVE Film and Media Arts Festival, 2014. She performed at the Toronto Fringe Festival in 2016 with the

production "We Are XX" and is currently in a residency at the Whippersnapper Gallery which will culminate in the showing of her ongoing short documentary project "Will You Listen?: Latinx Voices of Tkaronto".

Previous year's mentees include actor and choreographer Michael Greyeyes (Seven Seconds); Dora and Juno Award nominee Jani Lauzon (eu•tha•na•sia); Michelle Latimer (Tomorrow); Tyler Hagan (Estuary), Adrienne Marcus Raja (Soli), Jaene Castrillon (Celebration of Darkness) and Jamie Whitecrow (Heidi Lost).
